

Whether you organized a socially distanced mask sewing bee, donated your time or money to a local charity or simply checked on a neighbor to make sure they were ok, your contributions were (and are) valued and acknowledged. Because of you, the SaskTel Pioneers have been able to provide continued support to organizations who needed it more than ever, proving that we are dedicated to assisting our communities through this pandemic to the very best of our abilities.

We might not be able to get our fellowship events in, or work together as we are used to, but we still show the province how dedicated we are to our community's health and well being. 





Back Packs - donated 350 to schools in Saskatoon

50/50 tickets – Winner was Sheri Wollf of Saskatoon won \$9,465.00. Tickets were sold over two Months as a fundraiser to Pioneer Projects. Draw was held on Friday February 14th, 2020. Chapter 59 has applied for a license with SLGA for another provincial 50/50 draw—all monies will go to organizations in the community. Will be sold online only—open to anyone living in Saskatchewan. We've all heard about the SaskTel Pioneers. Many of us are proud members, in fact. But within the steady stream of good deeds the Pioneers partake in annually, it's easy to forget about what the Pioneers are all about.

The SaskTel Pioneers are a network of current and former telecom industry employees from across North America and can include both partners and family members.

While the original 'Telephone Pioneers' began in Boston in 1911, it wasn't until 1947 that Saskatchewan Chapter 59 became a member. In 1995, recognizing the need to strengthen and build on an already solid relationship, a formal partnership was signed between the Pioneers and SaskTel. In return for being a part of the SaskTel planning process, the Pioneers provide a business plan which assists SaskTel in meeting its commitment to social responsibility and good citizenship. This business plan includes the Pioneers being involved in activities that align to the researched needs of our communities, membership and sponsoring company.

These activities include:

- Corporate Contributions Pioneers provide the hands on where SaskTel Community Relations makes a financial contribution
- Provincial corporate volunteer projects
- Salvage Operations selling surplus computers donated by SaskTel

The latter is part of the partnership the Pioneers enjoy with Industry Canada for their 'Computers For Schools' program. The SaskTel Pioneers have refurbished over 70,000 computers and printers since the program began in 1993. This represents a saving of approximately \$60,000,000.00 to schools and libraries in Saskatchewan.

The 'value add' the Pioneers bring to SaskTel can be seen in the partnerships they have with schools across the Province. Activities include e-mail pen pals, mentoring, P.O.W.E.R. Packs, playground maps, clothing and food drives, hygiene kits, job shadowing, drug awareness and many other activities.

It Truly is a Beautiful Thing Teamwork Restores Spiritwood Services

When Jack Van Dyke heard a knock on his door in the early morning hours of 23 Aug 2020, he never imagined that it would be related to his previous work.

Jack, a former Customer Service Technician for SaskTel in the Town of Spiritwood retired in 2019 after 44 years of service for the corporation. He still lives in Spiritwood and happens to live across the street from the current CST in Town, Ryan Andersen. Knowing Jack from his years in the community, it was the RCMP who knocked on both his and Ryan's door to notify them that the SaskTel Central District office was on fire.

"My first reaction when I saw the blaze was this is unbelievable," says Jack. "As a CST this is your worst nightmare of what could happen to your services."

The blaze entirely destroyed the CDO knocking out landline, internet, data and cellular services in the Town of Spirtwood and surrounding area north up to Chitek Lake, south to Rabbit Lake and east to the Town of Debden. What transpired over the next number of days is something Jack marveled at in his days as a SaskTel employee; and that is what can be accomplished when SaskTel works as a team.

From Construction services to Service Technicians to Sales and beyond, numerous SaskTel departments began working hand in hand 24/7 to get the services restored.

It was in his farewell message in Leaving on a Jet Plane on The Source in July 2019 that Jack wrote:



"When all the departments within SaskTel pull energetically in the same direction great things can happen, it is a beautiful thing." – Jack Van Dyke


"Seeing how quickly SaskTel was able to restore services in Spiritwood is exactly what I meant in my farewell message and what can happen when all departments at SaskTel pull

While wireless services were restored early in the week, landline services remained out and the safety of those vulnerable was of concern. Jack along with the Town of Spiritwood's Chief Administration Officer delivered pre-paid cell phones to the towns senior complex and a number of senior housing units enabling them to call 911 in the event of an emergency.

"It was fun to be a part of the team once again," says Jack. "Of course, the real credit goes to everyone at SaskTel from those who were on hand immediately, worked with the community and everyone who has worked so diligently to get the services restored



HOOP and Telcare— Two of Many Things That Make Us a Top 100 Company

When Faraz Rizvi's now 11-year-old son Aryaan was diagnosed with severe autism, Faraz began to seek all available options for the treatment of his boy.

He soon discovered that stem-cell treatment offered one of the best potential therapeutic benefits for the neurodevelopmental disorder that impacts brain development.

"We took Aryaan to Mexico for the first treatment in 2018, and we, along with our family physician, felt that a measure of progress had been made," said Faraz, who works as a Manager – Consumer Sales at the Contact Centre in Saskatoon.

Inspired by the results, the family then decided to make a second trip earlier this year to a facility in Panama that's renowned as a leader in stem-cell treatment. With more progress made, the family is keen on returning to Panama in the coming months. But between the treatments, the travel and all associated costs, financial considerations have become a concern.

"As one can imagine, the expenses have been astronomical as we have dipped into our savings," said Faraz, who has spent upwards of \$42,000 up to this point. "Every penny counts. Still, when a fellow employee suggested I inquire for a bit of funding from HOOP, I did so with some hesitation."

HOOP is SaskTel's confidential Helping Our Own People fund. Among other things, the initiative offsets the financial burden of extended health care and illness costs. Faraz is thankful for having the option of reaching out to HOOP.

"I was amazed at how overwhelmingly positive HOOP has been for me and for my family," said Faraz. "The whole process was handled in a respectful and private way. The funding we received went a long way in helping us out and resulted in an immeasurable level of relief."

Faraz's experience also made it evident to him why SaskTel was recently recognized as one of Canada's Top 100 Employers, "I've worked for other companies, and felt like I was treated like a number," he said. "It's not like that at SaskTel. HOOP is proof of the supportive environment we have here that goes beyond paying the bills and supporting our lifestyles. We work for an employer that's genuinely caring." It's one of the reasons Faraz was enthusiastic to share such a deeply personal story with his SaskTel co-workers.

"I'm open about this because it allows me to accept the situation," he said. "But also, because I want people to know that HOOP is an option for them in their hour of need." "Employees are valued at SaskTel, and the company takes care of its people."

SaskTel TelCare (contributions by current employees and SaskTel

TelCare is another way for employees and SaskTel help our fellow employees and non profit charities in the province. TelCare has raised and donated over \$1.4 million dollars throughout the province in the last five years. Employees contribute regularly through optional payroll deductions. For every dollar donated by an employee, SaskTel contributes an additional \$.50 cents. With no overhead, 100 per cent of funds donated go directly back to the community, and since employees are the primary donors, they are also the ones who decide what organizations in their community to support each year. SaskTel Pioneers and SaskTel EnviroCare are another two means of SaskTel employees/retirees contribute to our communities.





Pioneers Put Together Heart Pillows for Coronary Patients

Throughout the course of the year, the SaskTel Pioneers play a role in many heart-warming stories.

Their participation in the creation of Heart Pillows is literally one of those stories!

The Bridge City SaskTel Pioneers in Saskatoon, along with members of the Coronary Rehab Group (CARG) held a Heart Pillow bee on 27 Oct 2019 at Grace Westminster Church in Saskatoon.

"Heart Pillows are designed to aid patients recovering from heart surgery at Royal University Hospital (RUH)," said Ken Johnston, a member of CARG who are made up of individuals who have had open heart surgery and who provide the pillows to the RUH. "We like to have one for every patient who has had open heart surgery."

The pillows serve as comfort after surgery. If a patient coughs, they can press the pillow against their chest to alleviate any pain that may exist. The making and distribution of the Heart Pillows is coordinated by RUH along with CARG. Cloth is ordered, heart shapes are cut out of the cloth, and graphics are placed on each pillow.

The Heart Pillows are then sewn together twice a year by SaskTel Pioneer members (as well as volunteers from CARG). In the latest Heart Pillow bee, 175 pillows were made. Ken says about 40 pillows are handed out every six to eight weeks.

Ken, who had quadruple by-pass surgery himself 15 years ago, says the Heart Pillows were a comfort to

him when he went through surgery. "By being presented with the Heart Pillows after their surgery, it provides some comfort and lets patients know someone cares about them."

"We feel this is a very important project, and one we are very happy to be a part of," said Brenda Iwasiuk, who coordinates the Heart Pillows project for the Bridge City Pioneers. "It's a great cause and like with any Pioneer project, it's a chance to be reacquainted with familiar faces, all while adding an element of caring into the community."

The Regina Life Member Club are actively involved in this project as well.

"The Pioneers are a great organization to work with," added Ken. "Brenda and the group do a tremendous job for us and we are pleased that they continue to take this project on, helping those who have gone through heart surgery."





Greening McVeetySaskTel EnviroCare and the Pioneers Make Donation to Vandalized Daycare

Kindness and caring can play a role in helping to soothe even the most senseless of situations.

Tony learned that the vandalism included the complete destruction of a wooden playhouse, climbing structures, seating and interaction spaces.

"We felt this was an opportunity to make something positive out of a negative situation," said Tony. "It also related well to EnviroCare's mission of 'Greening the spaces in which we work and live in'. We therefore dedicated \$2,500 o the rebuilding efforts at McVeety school, which will be used towards the development of a green space within the play area." The Pioneers' support will go directly into the playground.


Besides its planned projects, EnviroCare makes donations like this one a few times a year when they discover a situation that fits within their mandate where they might be of assistance. In this case, the group was able to assist the YMCA (which is a charitable none-profit organization) in dealing a situation that arose unexpectedly.

The EnviroCare donation was made possible due to the proceeds the group receives from their internal bottle recycling efforts they have set up at SaskTel. The group also received a special contribution of \$5,000 from the SaskTel Pioneers earlier this year to mark their fifth-year anniversary.

Fostering Goodwill

Organization for Foster Families Recognizes the SaskTel Pioneers

The SaskTel Pioneers have always made a point of fostering good will in Saskatchewan communities.

One shining example of that is the work they do with the Saskatchewan Foster Families Association (SFFA).

The SFFA is an organization that supports and encourages foster families through education and advocacy, helping create healthy homes, positive environments, and brighter futures for children and youth in care across the province. The Pioneers first became involved with SFFA when Kevin Harris, an Account Executive who is himself a foster parent, approached Pioneer Manager Darrell Liebrecht about the donation of an old SaskTel videoconferencing platform SaskTel no longer required.

Instead of salvaging the equipment or putting it up for re-sale, it was donated by the Pioneers to the SFFA and used to revamp Saskatchewan's foster parent training program. The equipment is now part of the SFFAs new offices in Saskatoon. Darrell attended a media event held on 12 Dec 2019 in which the training room was officially named after SaskTel and the Pioneers.

"We're really proud to have been part of providing SFFA with the technology that allows them to help recruit and train foster parents in a new way." said Darrell.

"The focus of the curriculum is to provide insight and new skills for foster parents as they work with children and youth who have experienced different degrees of trauma in their lives, to become Trauma Competent Caregivers," said Kevin, who developed the training made possible by videoconference. "We help foster parents understand the life altering impact of trauma and how to view life from the lens of a wounded child."

The trauma training has now become mandatory for all foster parents, who no longer must travel long distances for training.

"The donation of the videoconferencing equipment has made a huge difference for families that are not able to participate in-person for training sessions," said Deb Davies, Executive Director, SFFA. "The videoconferencing has also allowed other community organizations to deliver training from our facility in training our members. The equipment has provided support to families across our province and assisted in making our organization more efficient in conducting our day-to day business."

A new 'time tracker' app developed by SaskTel International (SI) is also making a difference. The app was developed for SFFA's 200 in-home support staff, that support families across the province. It enhances safety, accountability and allows a more efficient submission of timesheets.

"SaskTel, SI and the SaskTel Pioneers have made major contributions to SFFA," said Deb. "We would like to thank them for their continued support of our organization and families across Saskatchewan."

Along with learning a new language, getting accustomed to new surroundings or finding employment, many new Canadians face unsuspecting challenges such as the cold of our prairie winter.

It's cold in Canada and some of our new immigrants who come in are learning just how cold it is.

That's why when the centre received a donation of a boxful of socks from SaskTel recently, clients were very excited. "Sometimes it can be challenging for these individuals to get something that little bit extra like socks" says Melissa." The socks were definitely appreciated to help keep their feet warm."

The donation was just a small part of the over 5,000 pairs of socks collected by SaskTel employees in the recent Socks in a Box Corporate Challenge. The campaign, which ran in December 2019, challenged employees to help keep the feet of Saskatchewan's homeless and at-risk population warm by donating socks and/or money. Along with the over 5,000 pairs of socks collected, over \$1,000 in cash was also donated.

"As I walked out, she started to cry. She said it had been a long time since she had seen anyone due to COVID-19. That kind of touched me because she was not feeling well and all alone."

What he did next was touching. On his lunch break, Pierce purchased some flowers and then left the bouquet in the lady's door. Along with it a note: "I noticed you were sad when I dropped by to fix your phone. I hope these brighten your day. Sincerely, Pierce - The SaskTel Guy."

That act of kindness prompted the customer's niece to publicly commend Pierce on his thoughtfulness. In a facebook post, the niece wrote:

"The technician arrived on Sunday afternoon; he came in full protective gear and checked out her phone and extension phones and then left. Due to his gear, she was unable to totally see his face, but she said he was such a nice polite young man.

I'm sure there are not a lot of "SaskTel Guys" named Pierce who work in Regina. On behalf of my Aunt and our family I would like to give 'Pierce' a big hug and an even bigger 'Thank you' for your thoughtfulness you showed Auntie on Easter Sunday.

You have no idea what your kindness meant to her at this time."

The story reached the desk of SaskTel President and CEO Doug Burnett who in a recent video address to employees shared Pierce's story saying "Thank you, Pierce, for making us all SaskTel Proud."

This isn't the first time a SaskTel CST has gone above and beyond by adding a human element in this fashion. Trent Templeton, Director - Customer Services (Regina), shared a similar story that occurred last September. SaskTel Pioneers sew non-medical masks

Although sewing may not be the most common past time, SaskTel Pioneers across Saskatchewan have taken to needle and thread to help provide comfort and protection for those in need during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Pioneers have been busy sewing hundreds of masks after Canada's top doctor, Dr. Theresa Tam, announced that there is new evidence suggesting that non-medical masks can help protect the people around you limiting the spread of Covid-19 in places like grocery stores and public transit.

"Our members saw this as a fantastic opportunity. We all know someone who could be affected by the virus, so it was great to see the Pioneers jumping on board with this project to help make the most of a challenging situation," said Dwayne Iwasuik, President of the Saskatoon Bridge City Pioneers. With the help of Chapter President Dione Wall, and Regina Life Member Jolene Norleen the project gained quick popularity among Pioneers and community members alike.

"We've even had the Riverview Hutterite Colony volunteer to help us sew the masks with the fabric we have available. They heard about the project from one of our members, and it's humbling to see how other groups have stepped up to the plate out of sheer kindness," Dwayne said. Prairie Girls Kitchen Linens donated material for our masks.

Each mask has elastic ear loops and is made of pima cotton – a higher-end cotton with a reputation for being ultradurable and producing a fabric that's soft to the touch.

The masks will first be distributed to care homes and transition houses across the province (places such as Grace William Care Community and the Pasqua Hospital day Surgery Unit in Regina) by request and then made available to other community members. Besides being available for the community, SaskTel employees could also pick a mask up for a donation of their choice, with the proceeds going to a provincial charity. The sale of masks to employees has raised almost \$2000.

"We are definitely taking this on with the intention of making it a long-term project if needed," he said.

"This is another wonderful project for us to take on because it fits right in the Pioneers' wheelhouse. We have the opportunity to help the community and it also gives some of our members the opportunity to contribute something special while they're staying safe at home," Darrell said.

3560 masks were made across the province—distributed over 2800 to date—over 1500 volunteer hours and 32 volunteers



Computers for Schools Helps Long Term Facility Residents Stay in Touch

Covid-19 has made things different for all of us. One group that has really felt the changes that have arisen are residents in senior care homes and long-term facilities. That's especially true when it comes to staying in touch with friends and loved ones.

Enter the Computers for Schools (CFS) program!

The program has supplied laptops, iPads and mobile devices to long term care facilities. This allows residents to reach out to people who are important to them. Conversely, it also gives peace of mind to those who can't presently visit the residents but can still contact them.

"We're currently trying to fill as many requests as possible," said Keith Grill, Executive Director, CFS. "It's all worth it to know we are putting a smile on people's faces when they get to see their families. It makes you feel like you're helping out, even if it's in a small way."

Through the Computers for Schools program, the Pioneers have donated 606 laptops, iPads and mobile devices to long term care facilities and schools. This allows residents to reach out to people who are important to them, while giving peace of mind to those who are not able to visit the residents but can still contact them. The equipment from CFS has been sent to facilities such as the Bethany Pioneer Village in Middle Lake; the Cut Knife Health Complex; the Nokomis Health Centre, the Moose Mountain Lodge in Carlyle and Long Lake Valley Integrated Centre in Imperial to name but a few.

"With the visitation restrictions in place by Public Health, this is a way to link families," said Jason Carson, who is Senior Administrator for four Extendicare facilities in Regina and Saskatoon. Extendicare received a dozen laptops as well as iPads and one mobile device for each facility from CFS.

"Through video conference on these devices, people are able to stay in touch with loved ones," he added. To date, CFS has sent out: 10 iPads; 45 iPhones; three desktop computers and 53 laptops.

"We're happy to do our part to help people of all ages get past this challenging time," said Keith. "Ultimately, we would like to see our warehouse empty. That's how we'll know we're doing a good job!"

Computers for Schools—donated 600 Computers to schools and students who do not have any other device available that can be used for distance learning during the pandemic.

London Drugs in Regina and Saskatoon have partnered with Computers for schools until the end of September. They will donate laptops and computers that they normally sent to be recycled. CFS, which has been serving Saskatchewan for over 25 years at their two hubs in Saskatoon and Regina are excited to receive these additional units. The work, performed by a predominantly volunteer staff, gives hard drives an additional memory wipe before reconditioning the units to be used by students throughout the province. "In the life cycle of a year, we'll send out about 4,500 to 5,000 computers," CFS executive director Keith Grill said.





Ready to GrowSaskTel Pioneers Help to Provide Books for Youth Literacy

While many school operations and protocol will look a bit different this fall due to the pandemic, one thing certainly remains the same: the importance and value of a good book for every child. With the help of the SaskTel Pioneers, organizers of the First Book Canada Drive said the event was another huge success this year in Regina and Saskatoon.



Pioneer volunteers were busy sorting and distributing over 25,000 books as part of a partnership with First Book Canada. The non-profit organization works with schools, libraries and other partners across the country to ensure that all children can have access to new, high-quality books.

"With schools and libraries closed for months during the pandemic, accessibility to books dried up very quickly," said Tom Best, Executive Director with First Book Canada. "Our whole purpose is to allow all children, regardless of their financial situation, access to books. So, this drive was more important than ever."

Tom says families often take reading for granted as a common practice, and according to statistics from First Book Canada, a quarter of Canadian households don't even own a single book.

"Books are so incredibly important for building literacy skills, especially in rural areas where parents often don't have access to pre-kindergarten and other early childhood learning programs," Crystal said. "Not only does literacy make all the difference for a child's development, but books can also help parents and children create a special bond when they sit down together and read as a family."

This is the seventh year the SaskTel Pioneers in Regina worked together with First Book Canada to put new resources in the hands of Saskatchewan youth. "Our Pioneers love this project each year, and it was easy to gather volunteers even through the pandemic," said Jolene Norleen, with the SaskTel Pioneers in Regina.

For students at 33 Central School in Fillmore, the books donated from the drive have helped boost their reading level test scores to what Literacy Teacher Dawn Ray describes as "more than acceptable" overall. "Several years ago, reading scores were so low that the school division was concerned," Dawn said. "This program really helped increase those scores and we are forever grateful for these donations. Without First Books there is no way we could supply these children with the number of books that we have. This is huge for us."



The books were distributed to registered organizations and teachers from in and around the Regina and Saskatoon areas, representing both the Public and Catholic School Boards, as well as some private schools.

Yorkton club (Jean Bryski) donated books to SIGN Early Learning Centre and daycare. Met some very excited children. They each got to pick a book they wanted. One little girl said her mom would be excited that she was bringing a book home. A perfect

A Rare View

Weyburn Employee's Live-Stream Captures Biologists' Attention

Kelly Kozij has a keen interest in birds of prey.

"Falcons, hawks, eagles, owls. All birds of prey really," says Kelly, a Trucking and Switching Technician from Weyburn. "I've got an interest in all wildlife, but somehow birds of prey have always been of a bit more interest."

Kelly's interest peaked a few years ago when a pair of Merlins, a mall spcies of falcon, decided to nest in a spruce tree outside of his Weyburn home. So much so that Kelly set up a live webcam to stream the activity of the birds and its young over the internet.

This spring, the Merlins were back and on May 2, the first of five eggs was laid.

That's when Kelly's live stream caught the attention of biologists.

"When I streamed it a few years ago, Weyburn was on copper for our internet service which didn't provide the quality needed for streaming video, so the feed wasn't very good," says Kelly. "But now that the City has *infinet*, I'm able to upload at a higher speed which gives a much better streaming quality for others to watch."

After sharing the link with a few interested friends, Kelly began receiving chat messages from biologists in Saskatoon and Ontario. The feed has also caught the attention of falconers from as far away as Washington State and Oregon.

Kelly says the Merlins are the most commonly found birds of prey in urban centres, however he says the nesting habit of this species has never been documented in the way he has been able to share.

"The biologists I've spoken to say they have never seen a nestcam like this before," adds Kelly. "A biologist in Saskatoon I'm in contact with is writing a paper about the nesting activity of the Merlins right from the time the eggs were laid, through the hatching and the fledgling period when the young leave the nest."

Biologists are recording every detail; how long the mother falcon is on the nest, how often they feed the young and how the female interacts with the male.

"The biologists have been interested in how the male gets food to the female. It seems that the female makes a call and then her and the male meet at another tree where the food is transferred."

Kelly says of the five eggs that were laid, four hatched. The young are approximately 2 weeks old and Kelly expects the birds will be on the nest until approximately late July.

Until then, Kelly will remain in contact with biologists who are paying close attention to his live feed.

"The first year I streamed this, I had only 8 or 10 viewers in total, but now I get about 8 or 10 a day who are truly interested. It's pretty cool people are watching and recording what's happening, especially when it has never been witnessed before. "



Signing up for the new SASKATCHEAN ONLINE ORGAN, TISSUE DONOR REGISTRY

Saskatchewan Online Organ, Tissue Donor Registry has been officially launched as of September 4, 2020. It's important for families to discuss organ donation to help ensure everyone's feeling and intentions on the issue are known.

This not only includes you (our retirees) but your family as well. Ensuring others know your choice is vital.

Having this conversation when it isn't a stressful time is recommended.

This program was launched to expand the pool of organ and tissue donors. Prior to this date, we had to place a sticker on our health card indicating one's consent.

Anyone over the age of 16 can register to become an organ donor.

The Saskatchewan Organ Donor Registry has the ability to accommodate a change to a presumed consent/opt -out model if a decision is made to do so. They will assess the potential benefits and any risks associated with a presumed consent model in Saskatchewan.

According to stats—one tissue donor can help 75 people and one organ donor can save eight lives.

Kidney transplants are a common request to families.

This online registry will provide the province with a better idea of how many have opted in to be organ donors.
