




Ambulance operators have launched the idea that everyone puts in their contact list the person to contact in case of an emergency under a predefined pseudonym.



There are many significant reasons to remember the year 1908.

Transportation was transformed with the launch of the Ford Model T car, which could be driven off the lot for \$260. The Wright Brothers proved to the world that they had mastered flying with a nearly two-and-a-half-hour flight, the longest ever made in an airplane to that point. That same year, and much closer to home, telephones in our province also took flight with the establishment of the Department of Railways, Telegraphs and Telephones.

Lots has happened since those fledgling years.

For starters, even though the name 'SaskTel' had already been in use for several years, it was not our company's official name until 1969. That year, an act of legislature was passed amending the Saskatchewan Government Telephones act and the corporation became officially known as Saskatchewan Telecommunications.

There have been several firsts along the way, including:

- being the first in the world to complete what was the longest commercial fiber optic network.
- being the first telecommunications company in Canada to complete its rural individual line service program, eliminating party lines throughout Saskatchewan.
- SaskTel International took part in the largest construction project of the 20th Century, the English Channel Tunnel (The Chunnel) project.
- SaskTel was one of the first in Canada to offer IPTV *Max*™ Service.
- The launch of SaskTel's digital mobile service branded as Lüm Mobile.

Of course, these are but a very few incredible moments in our company's illustrious past. Throughout the years, our commitment to our communities we serve has also gone beyond business. From the very beginning, SaskTel has built a strong reputation as a socially responsible corporation, dedicated to investing in Saskatchewan.

- >> We see this in our contributions to non-profit and charitable organizations, community associates, venues, events and partnerships in 144 communities.
- >> We see it through the work of our SaskTel Pioneers and through our SaskTel TelCare program both of which make significant impacts in our communities.
- >> We see it in our greening efforts and in our ongoing efforts to make diversity, equity and teamwork a high priority.

Today we are the leading Information and Communications Technology (ICT) provider in Saskatchewan with 1.4 million customer connections. A far cry from the days when our first telephone exchanges were built at Hanley and Melville! The world has changed so much over the years. One thing that has never changed is our commitment to connecting Saskatchewan to the world.

Competing locally can be fierce enough when it comes to sports. Facing off against some of the best players in the world is another story altogether.

Two Regina area ringette teams, the Buffalo Plains Impact and Regina Rattlers, from two different associations (Buffalo Plains Ringette Association and the Regina Ringette Association), had the opportunity to do just that this past April, as they competed against teams in Sweden, Finland and Czechia.

"The experience was amazing, a once in a lifetime opportunity to travel with a great group of kids and parents," said Nathan Kirkham, SaskTel's Chief Information Officer.

Nathan is an Assistant Coach with the Impact. His daughter Brynn is also a player with the Impact. "The girls had the opportunity to be together as a team for two years, this allowed them to grow very close and at times seem to be more like sisters. They played like a team and we able to beat some of the best under 16 ringette teams in the world."

Nathan was not the only SaskTel tie to the ringette teams.

Adriel Picard, Corporate Services Manager – Supply Chain Management, also has a daughter (Addyson) who plays on the Buffalo Plains Impact Impact team. Customer Systems Analyst Stacey Wilker's daughter Falon plays on the Regina Rattlers. Nathan says the idea to compete overseas came about due to several factors.

"Firstly, we actively sought out international exposure for our players to enhance their skills and broaden their horizons," he said. "We recognized the value of competing against teams from different countries with diverse playing styles. We worked closely with a partner the specializes in setting up the competitions that we played in."

"We also worked very closely with our team management, sponsors, and the parents of our players to secure the necessary funding and logistical support for the trip. We organized fundraising events, reached out to sponsors, and diligently planned the logistics of travel, accommodations, and tournament registration."

Quite the undertaking! So how did it go?

"We (the Buffalo Plains Impact) played 9 games and we went 7-2 overall," said Nathan. "The greatest competition was in Finland where we played in a tournament and were the first international team to medal, winning bronze. We did beat the team that ended up winning gold in the round robin portion of the tournament, so we were very competitive throughout."

Things did not go as well for the Regina Rattlers, but on occasions like these, it's the experiences that matter.

"There were many special memories for all involved, both on and off the ice, that will never be forgotten," said Nathan.

The overseas trip by these teams may very well have paved the way for similar trips to be taken by other Regina teams, as the Regina Ringette Association plans to incorporate a European travel team into its program for players every other year.

The Pioneers Heart Pillow Project Celebrates 30 Years in Regina

It's safe to say that both patients and volunteers hold the SaskTel Pioneers Heart Pillow Project near and dear to their hearts.

The project involves cutting, stuffing and hand-sewing red heart shaped pillows for use by patients at the General Hospital who are recovering from open heart surgery.

"Patients hold the pillows against their chests to alleviate pain when they cough and can also be used to protect their chests when using a seatbelt," said Andrea Hasz, Heart Pillow Project Coordinator with the Pioneers in Regina. "And, if the patient is out for a walk and requires help, the silk-screening print on the pillow helps indicate to members of the public that they have recently had surgery."

Andrea has been involved with the project since it launched in Regina back in 1993, but she became even more passionate about it when her brother went through a successful triple bypass surgery in 1994 at the age of 40. He passed away in September 2011.

"I think this project is important because almost everyone, including myself, knows someone who has had open heart surgery, whether it be a family member, friend, co-worker or neighbour," Andrea said.

The project is celebrating it's 30th anniversary in 2023. In Regina alone – just over 7500 pillows have been made by volunteer groups comprised of SaskTel Pioneers, SaskTel employees, their partners, friends, family members and SaskPower employees, among others over that time. Regina club made 300 pillows in 2023.

However, without the help of staff at the Saskatchewan Health Authority, this project would not be the success that it is today.

Koreena Kunz, Volunteer Services Coordinator at the Saskatchewan Health Authority, works with Andrea to arrange for drop-off at the hospital once the pillows are ready to be distributed at the General Hospital.

"Both staff and patients are very appreciative of the pillows as they provide comfort post-operation," Koreena said.

"The staff are the ones who provide the pillows to the patients and instruct them on how to use them and what is required for a healthy recovery."

The Bridge City Pioneers are also running the project in Saskatoon this year, in partnership with the Coronary Rehab Group (CARG), who help those who require rehabilitation to regain strength and health after experiencing a cardiac episode. The pillows will once again be delivered

to patients at Saskatoon's Royal University Hospital.



"This project gives back to the community and provides something that, to my knowledge, no other group does," said Brenda Iwasuik, Heart Pillow Project Coordinator with the Bridge City Pioneers. "I have heard stories of people who have had heart surgeries actually asking hospital staff 'When do I get my pillow?', so the project is well-known!"

Each school was contacted, and those that were interested were signed up with a bus that would take students and their families to the Enchanted Forest."

Last year's bus tour took place from December 5 - 8, 2022. Over the course of those days, more than 30 volunteers, armed with 480 treat bags and song sheets, met the families at the participating schools and headed to the forest. In all, there were 16 bus trips with 36 people on board each time.

"I believe it is so important to give back," said Bonny. "There are so many opportunities that we take for granted and paying to tour the Enchanted Forest may be one of those things for these families."

Right Place, Right Time Customer Service Technician Plays a Big Part in Saving a Man's Life

Adam Reimer credits emergency training for helping him to save a man's life while on a customer call in Saskatoon.

The daily routine of a SaskTel Customer Service Technician (CST) can be anything but routine. Every client call is different. As Adam Reimer, a CST from Saskatoon recently found out, it could even be a matter of life and death.

"Adam was at a repair at a home the weekend of September 9, 2023," said Stacey Klassen, Operations Manager - Service. "There was still work to be done, so he made arrangements with the customer to go back to the home.

Adam arrived a bit early for the appointment. The SaskTel customer lives in the upstairs of a home on Dufferin Avenue, and there is a tenant in a suite in the basement. For the work required, Adam had to run lines from the basement to the main floor of the home where the customer resides.

"While in the basement I noticed a gentleman who was clearly in distress," said Adam.

"Everything kind of kicked in - I immediately remembered my First Aid and CPR training, tended to the person, conducted tests to determine if the man had a stroke, and called 911."

The training Adam refers to is the emergency First Aid training all CSTs are required to partake in every three years. The course offers both First Aid Training and CPR, and completion requires demonstration of all skills, 100% attendance and 75% minimum on a written exam.

Having visited the home a couple of times, Adam knew that the suite was in a location that is difficult to get to, accessible only by the back alley. He quickly ran to the street to ensure the ambulance could find the suite and flagged the ambulance down.

As it turns out, the gentleman had a heart attack the day before and lived through it. While Adam was in his room to check for wire runs, the gentleman had a stroke. "I've been in contact with his best friends that he lives with and he's doing okay," said Adam. "But he's not coming home anytime soon." But things may have been different if he was not in the right place at the right time.

Adam credits his 11 years of experience and First Aid training for being able to make a difference. "I always think to myself 'how am I going to remember all my training and knowledge over all these years?" he said. "Fortunately, this (First Aid) training came back to me when I really needed it and I helped to save someone's life."

We leave you with this update about the gentleman sent by the SaskTel customer who Adam originally went to help that day: "He is much better today. Saw him. Speaking clearly and in small sentences. Very lucid. He says he will walk again. He's intent on coming home too. All in all, he seems to be on the mend, thank God. Thanks again for all you did that fateful day!"




